

## Year 9 Festival Home Learning Tasks

The following lessons draw on work which would be set in lessons and additional research or tasks which make music accessible at home.

Each lesson should take an hour to complete. Extension work can be completed outside of this time but is optional.

Upload your work onto Google Classroom. You can either upload documents or take photos of handwritten work and upload these. The link to your Google class was sent to you on Milk.

### Lesson 1

<b>Task</b>	<b>Details</b>	<b>Resources to Support Learning</b>
<b>1.</b>	List 10 different music festivals from around the world. For example - Glastonbury, Coachella	Google
<b>2.</b>	Choose a festival and start a project on any format that you wish. (word, powerpoint, slides) <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● What year did the festival start?</li><li>● Where is it held?</li><li>● What makes the festival famous?</li><li>● Include site maps or festival pictures.</li></ul>	
<b>3.</b>	Imagine you are going to create your own festival. Write a list of 5 possible venues that you could use in the UK. For each find out and write down their; <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● capacity</li><li>● location</li></ul> Choose which you think is the best for a festival that you might create and explain why.	
<b><u>Extension</u></b>	Add the video clips from festivals which give a clear impression of the atmosphere to your project as hyperlinks.	

## Lesson 2

Task	Details	Resources to Support Learning
1.	<p>Make a list of 15 artists that would headline your festival and explain why you have chosen them.</p> <p>Put them in the order you would have them perform - warmup acts first followed by the main headliners.</p>	
2.	<p>Choose one artist from your festival and write a biography on them</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Where are they from?</li> <li>● How did they break into the music industry?</li> <li>● Where did they study performance if they did?</li> <li>● Have they always worked as a performer or did they do other jobs before becoming famous?</li> <li>● Do they have any other roles in the music industry e.g. song writer, music producer etc?</li> </ul>	
3.	<p>Research how much your artist normally charges for a festival - some can charge thousands and some are cheap because they just want the exposure.</p>	
<b><u>Extension</u></b>	<p>Using your voice or if you have access to an instrument at home try and learn a song from your chosen artist.</p>	<p>Youtube for backing tracks or karaoke versions if songs</p>

## Lesson 3

Task	Details	Resources to Support Learning
1.	<p>What is a budget plan? Define profit and loss. Add some examples of budget plans. These don't have to be music related.</p>	<p>Google</p>
2.	<p>Create a budget plan for your festival - add up any costs you will have - staff, refreshments, artists, lighting etc.</p> <p>Then look at your money coming in - ticket sales, merchandise etc</p>	<p>You may want to do the budget plan on a spreadsheet</p>

	Set it out as a budget plan. The main aim is to make money!!	
<b>3.</b>	Outline your profit. How much money will you actually make?

<b>Task</b>	<b>Details</b>	<b>Resources to Support Learning</b>
<b>1.</b>	Some people do this for a living! Write a paragraph about the job of a festival promoter. Think about job roles, salary, qualifications.	Google - 'festival promoter jobs' or 'life as a festival promoter' You may need to hunt for information.
<b>2</b>	Design a poster for your festival - make sure you include the headline acts.	
<b>3.</b>	Finally - what health and safety considerations are there when you put on a music festival? Make a list and explain how you would overcome them.	Google
<b><u>Extension</u></b>	If there is anything else that you want to add to your project (E.g Glastonbury has other elements apart from the music which attracts visitors) then feel free - be creative.
